
Our **Investing in Our Faith**, **Investing in Our Future** Renewal is wrapping up. We are so grateful for those who responded to the initiative with a commitment to:



Guatemala Outreach

The Guatemala Outreach ministry at ND began in 2014; through it, 24 homes have been built for families in dire need of safe shelter. Although a mission trip has not



"As a parishioner, I wanted to contribute to our community in a unique way that fostered both friendship and stewardship. Knitting and crocheting do just that. As Missionary Disciples, the members of "The Flock" offer the fruits of their labors to other church ministries to be distributed to parishioners supported by their ministry. For example, the Baptism Ministry receives handmade baby hats and blankets to be offered to the families of newly baptized babies. The Homebound Ministry receives prayer shawls to be offered to those parishioners who cannot attend Mass in person."

Every Story Matters to God

A sign. Literally. An actual sign on Hanover Avenue by the Shop-Rite. It was small, but the words jumped out at me: "Catholics Returning Home," and it listed a phone number. I'm sure it was there for a while, but I didn't see it until I headed home from work on a night in January 2015 that was as dark, dreary, and desolate as I felt.



It was slightly more than a year after my divorce was final and just shy of two years from when it was decided that a marriage of 34 years would come to an end. For the first time in my life, I was completely on my own. I lived at home during college and married during my senior year. I moved with jobs to multiple cities across the country before landing in New Jersey with my then-husband, daughter, and no other family within 900 miles. It was a particularly low point in my life, filled with many emotions, the primary being overwhelming hopelessness.

I typed the phone number on the sign into my phone before the light changed. The following day, I forced myself to actually call it, not knowing that at the other end was Notre Dame of Mount Carmel. But more importantly, this is what I heard on the other end as I poured my heart out: empathy, understanding, caring, no judgment, and most of all, hope.

Two evenings later, I walked past a banner that read "My Parish, My Home" and into Mount Carmel of Notre Dame.



I didn't know a single person at the parish, but it indeed felt like the beginning of a journey home. It's a journey I continue to travel with new opportunities to grow and evolve personally and spiritually: Journey for Divorced and Separated, Discipleship Groups, Women's Cornerstone, Alpha. The evolution and growth didn't happen overnight, but slowly, comfortably, and at my own pace — baby steps, so to speak.

The first step in my desire to serve was timidly volunteering to take photos on Holy Thursday. Although I am a professional photographer, I lacked confidence in doing so at the church and was not sure my images would be good enough to use; nonetheless, I felt drawn.



I returned the next day to photograph Good Friday, the next evening to capture the Easter Vigil, and the next for Easter morning.

Since then, I have captured many parish celebrations and events. I've served in the Women's Cornerstone ministry, helped build a house in

Guatemala, led Discipleship Groups, and proclaimed the Word of God as a lector.





I just recently embarked on a new and thrilling role in the choir! I've wanted to do this for a long time but never thought I could!!





As I write this, today is the 10th anniversary of the day an official stamped document was handed to me in the Morris County Courthouse. On that day, I had no idea where my life would go. Today, I still have no idea where I go from here, but I know it is a journey with God filled with friends, family, faith, fun, and, above all — hope!







