Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion

Our Liturgy is a fantastic moment of encounter. We encounter Christ in each other as a community gathered in His name. We encounter Christ in the priest who makes our Lord present to us in persona Christi. We encounter Christ in the Word we hear, especially in the Gospel. And, of course, we encounter Christ in the Eucharist, our Church's greatest gift. But imagine if our Eucharistic feast could not reach all those who are able; how sad it would be.



In 1965, Pope Saint Paul VI instituted Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC) to assist the priests in distributing Holy Communion to the faithful. So often, we take for granted that we can come to Mass and not wait 20-30 minutes for the distribution of Holy Communion, but without this unsung hero, that wouldn't be the case. And critically, to those of our homebound who would otherwise be excluded from the Eucharistic feast, made present to our community by the faithful presence of EMHCs at their home.



In this time of Eucharistic Revival, our EMHCs are receiving new and recurring training to ensure they are prepared for this mission. The Eucharist is the Source and Summit of our faith, so it requires the utmost care and reverence. This duty is upon all the faithful in how we approach the Lord at Mass and in His home, the Church, but especially for our EMHCs who handle the Precious Body and Blood of Jesus. This is why every three years, at a minimum, EMHCs need to have training and be re-commissioned to serve in our specific community. It is also an opportunity for lay faithful to discern if God has called them to assist in new ways in our Church. Many are called to non-liturgical ministries, but some have felt a calling to serve the Lord as an EMHC and will be trained for the first time.

We all are responsible for sharing Christ with the world, but if we cannot be fed first, we won't have the strength to do it. We need the Eucharist, and until we have more priests and deacons, we will need our Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion to help serve us. So continue to pray for vocations to the ordained ministries and pray for the men and women who help to serve the Eucharistic feast to us. <u>St. Tarcisius</u>, Pray for us!



All Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist wishing to remain active in the ministry (including serving as subs only) and those wishing to be part of the ministry are asked to attend one of two gatherings:

- This Wednesday, September 27, at 6:30 pm.
- Saturday, October 14, at 9:30 am.

"Everyone Leads"

This past Saturday morning, **St. Paul Inside the Walls** hosted a special event, "A New Culture of Leadership to Revitalize Our Church," with keynote speaker and renowned author **Chris Lowney.** As the "Best Practices in Leadership" is one of the three fundamental values driving the renewal of our parish (the other two being Evangelization and Reliance on the Holy Spirit), a few from our parish headed to St. Paul's for this special opportunity to learn and be inspired and equipped as missionary disciples and leaders in our parish.



Much of Chris's sharing focused on aspects of our culture that could impact (positively or negatively) the fruitfulness of our mission of drawing people to Christ; one example he offered was breaking out of a culture of "blame" and instead focusing on actions to overcome setbacks, learn and move forward.



"Chris Lowney reminded us that we are all leaders and need to think of ourselves as leaders. He also reminded us that we need to take risks; we shouldn't be deterred by thoughts of failure (not all things will work). After Chris spoke, we were split into teams to identify items we can't change, those we can change, and those that must change. The last category was those we can change in our realm. Three of the four groups identified **invite** as something we can all do. We are blessed at our parish to hear the message of welcoming and inviting as part of our mission. Hopefully, this message of welcoming and inviting will be brought back to other parishes in our diocese." Debbie White




"In Transit" to Faith!

This month, our elementary families began using **Mass Transit Cards**, a weekly, lectionary-based faith conversation starter for parents and children.



One side of the card, which is read **before** attending Mass, has the readings for Sunday and a summary of how the readings relate to our lives, along with a discussion question.



The other side of the card has questions about that Sunday liturgy to be filled out after Mass. The completed cards are returned the following week and placed in the Mass Transit box.

Each week at the end of Mass, we acknowledge a family who completed a Mass Transit Card by pulling a card from a basket and presenting the family with a small token to help them foster conversation and continue their journey in faith.


